

## **Advanced Reconstruction and Major Scene Logistics**

50 hours, five consecutive Days

This POST approved course (1031- 31651) is intended for senior patrol, detectives and all investigators who may respond to complex multiple death crime scenes. The course is for those who may be involved in the investigation of the expansive crime scene covering multiple jurisdictions as well as the complex crime scene involving multiple fatalities. In addition, the class focuses on techniques relevant to the investigation of the serial criminal and continuing investigation of the “old and cold” homicide. This 50-hour, five day course provides the student numerous opportunities to demonstrate their comprehension of the material as well as to develop practical skills applicable to their on-duty assignments. The course hours listed below are adhered to. Registration fee is \$453.00.

#### **Course Outline:**

##### **DAY 1 (0800- 1800)**

- Review the basics of scene processing and pathways to evidence association
- Critical evidence and scene documentation: the impact of omissions and errors
- Managing the simple scene: recognizing the serial crime event
- Techniques for showing spatial, time, and geographic relationships,
- How reconstruction can lead to additional evidence in the scene and better interviews.

##### **DAY 2 (0730 – 1830)**

- Techniques for communication and organization within complex investigations
- Applying critical incident management and incident command system to expansive crime scenes – (table-top preparation for drill on day 3)
- Managing the major scene: coordinating evidence collection and communications
- How to obtain investigative consistency with diverse resources and personnel
- The logistics of a major multiple site scene... where to begin

##### **DAY 3 (0730 – 1900)**

- The entire day will be devoted to the processing of a major multiple site crime scene scenarios. The participants will perform full scene processing, collection, interpretation, and organization of a complex mass killing crime containing 10 or more bodies and hundreds of items of evidence spread over numerous locations.

##### **DAY 4 (0730- 1830)**

- The investigation of the serial crime... special problems and solutions
- Dealing with the unsolved case... finding the hidden clues
- Integrating the scene processing and results with an interview or interrogation

##### **DAY 5 (0730 – 1700)**

- Specialized topics
- An exhumation exercise...how to find them and how to collect them.
- Bloodstain patterns in unusual case scenarios
- Bone identification
- Advanced firearms evidence topics
- Presentation of homework exercise (Final exam)

### **STUDENT SHOULD BRING-**

The student should bring a basic crime scene kit including: measuring devices (at least a 20 foot tape and/or 100 foot tape), scene sketching materials, field use fingerprint materials (brush, powder, lift tape and cards), packaging materials (bags and small containers), sealing tape, twine, clipboard, note taking materials, small scissors, knife and or razor blade. If the student brings a departmental camera (and detachable flash) suitable for crime scene use, they will have opportunity to use it in several mock crime scenes to include macro photography. Additional specialized resources such as laser mapping, total station, drones, may be brought to class for practical deployment at the major scene simulation held Wednesday. Please inform the course coordinator if you intend to have those resources on site Wednesday.

This course involves classroom time and outdoor processing of crime scenes. Rain or shine, scenes will be processed. Be prepared for the weather.
